Expect An Answer

As a drought continued for what seemed an eternity, a small community of farmers was in a guandary as to what to do. Rain was important to keep their crops healthy and sustain the way of life of the townspeople. As the problem became more acute, a local priest called the people to a Holy Hour of prayer to ask God for rain. Many people arrived. The priest greeted most of them as they filed in. As he walked to the front of the church to officially begin the prayers, he noticed most people were chatting across the aisles and socialising with friends. When he reached the front his thoughts were on guieting the attendees and starting the Holy Hour. His eyes scanned the crowd as he asked for quiet. He noticed an eleven year-old girl sitting quietly in the front row. Her face was beaming with excitement. Next to her, poised and ready for use, was a bright blue umbrella. The little girl's beauty and innocence made the priest smile as he realised how much faith she possessed. No one else in the congregation had brought an umbrella. All came to pray for rain, but the little girl had come expecting God to answer her prayers...

Scrooge and St. Thomas Becket

Scrooge learned this lesson in the nick of time. We all remember Ebenezer Scrooge, the famous protagonist of Charles Dickens's masterpiece, A Christmas Carol. Scrooge had a very clear goal in life: making money. And as the richest man in the city, he achieved his goal. He made a very good living, but he had a miserable life. The human heart is made for greater things than wealth, prosperity, and pleasure. It is made to love God and love one's neighbour, and that's where true, everlasting happiness comes from. As soon as Scrooge started to put his wealth at the service of Christian love, he remembered how to smile. Scrooge is a fictional character, but the history of the Church boasts of a few saints who truly made that same discovery. St. Thomas Becket is one of them. He lived in England in the 1200s. He was best friends with King Henry II; they both were selfish, selfindulgent, and power hungry. They drank together, debauched together, and plotted together. Then King Henry got the idea of appointing Becket to be the Archbishop of Canterbury. Henry thought that having his best friend occupy the highest Church position in the land would give him a chance to control the Church and squeeze money out of it. But when Thomas Becket was ordained, God's grace touched his heart, and he began to see the folly of living just for earthly goals. He sold his considerable property and gave the money to the poor, stopped his loose living, and dedicated himself to serving Christ and the Church with all his energy and talent. The King wasn't pleased, and ended up having his former best friend murdered during Mass in the Cathedral. Becket traded in temporary earthly glory for a martyr's eternal crown - and you can rest assured that he has no regrets.

Re-Introduction of Chalice Communion

On the first Sunday of September, 2nd/3rd September 2023, we are able to return to the normative practice of receiving the Precious Blood of the Risen Lord from the Chalice at Mass. Some Parishioners have been asking: Can't I just "dip" the Consecrated Host into the Precious Blood? The normative way to receive the Precious Blood of the Lord is by taking a sip from the Chalice. The practice of "Intinction" (dipping the Body of Christ into the Blood of Christ) is not the ordinary way of receiving. Likewise, individuals are not permitted to intinct on their own. It must always be done by a minister. Furthermore, to receive in this way also eliminates the option to receive in the hand. Another common question: Why can't we use individual cups? The Lord himself gave us the Eucharist at the Last Supper and it is directed toward the intimate union of the faithful with Christ through "Communion". The practice of



sharing a chalice mirrors and remains more faithful to the command and action of the Lord at the Last Supper.



Meaning of the "Transfiguration"

What was the reason for the Transfiguration? According to St. Thomas Aquinas, the Transfiguration occurred because the divine glory which was Christ's was allowed for a moment to shine through His human body. He did this so that they could taste for a short time the contemplation of eternal joy, in view of the persecutions they would suffer. What does "transfiguration" mean? Transfiguration refers to Our Lord's change in appearance from the passable bodily form in which He would suffer and die, to the glorified form in which He would rise from the dead. The Latin root "trans-" means "across" or "through." The root "figura" means "form" or "shape." When did the Transfiguration happen? This event happened approximately a week after Jesus and the disciples went to Cæsarea Philippi, which is where Peter declared that Jesus was "the Christ of God" (Luke 9:20). Where did the Transfiguration take place? Although the Gospels only refer to it as a "high mountain," according to tradition it was on Mount Tabor in Israel. Not too far from Nazareth, a Franciscan church commemorates the traditional site, where 4th century and 12th century churches had previously existed. What does the Transfiguration teach us? Pope Francis said: "From the event of the Transfiguration I would like to take two significant elements that can be summed up in two words: ascent and descent. We all need to go apart, to ascend the mountain in a space of silence, to find ourselves and better perceive the voice of the Lord. This we do in prayer. But we cannot stay there! Encounter with God in prayer inspires us anew to "descend the mountain" and return to



the plain where we meet many brothers weighed down by fatigue, sickness, injustice, ignorance, poverty both material and spiritual. To these brothers in difficulty, we are called to bear the fruit of that experience with God, by sharing the grace we have received.'

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
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
